Superintendent's letter

Dear Friends

So now I find myself writing my final contribution to the Messenger as Superintendent. This also is the last edition of the Messenger for the existing Leicester Trinity Circuit. From September there will be a new Circuit, though for various reasons it will still be called the Leicester Trinity Circuit. The new Circuit will embrace the six Churches which currently form the Leicester North Circuit. Doubtless we will be welcoming some new preachers and ministers to conduct worship in our Churches. We also say goodbye to Rev David Willis as he moves to a new appointment. His ministry has been appreciated round the Circuit and we wish David and Zoe well for the future.

A little while ago I received a copy of a small booklet with the title, 'Methodism in and around Leicester'. There is no indication of the name of the author but from the text I deduce that the booklet was published in 1956. It records, 'John Wesley paid his first visit to Leicester on Whit Sunday, 10th of June 1753, and recorded it in these words: 'After dinner a gentleman who came to Markfield from Leicester invited me thither. About eight I preached there in a place near the walls called the Butt Close. The people came running together from all parts, high and low, rich and poor, and their behaviour surprised me; they were so serious and attentive, not one offering any interruption." Wesley's journal records several visits to Leicester, Markfield, Loughborough and Hinkley. Indeed he visited Leicester in 1790, the year before his death. Ten years earlier on a visit to the city on July 5th 1780, he commented in his journal, 'I know not how it is that I constantly find such liberty of spirit in this place.'

As I prepare to leave I think my hope for the new Circuit will be that there will again be a real 'liberty of spirit'. I do believe that in order to go on being the



Church we need to simply find joy and freedom in our relationship with Jesus, a 'liberty of spirit'. If that means that we have to let go of some of the structures of the Church as we have known it, well so be it.

It has been a privilege to serve in this Circuit and indeed in all the Circuits to which I have been stationed. Thank you to my colleagues, the lay leaders in the Circuit and the members and friends for allowing me to walk with you for a little while on our pilgrimage together.

People Page

Some of you are aware that Chris Merrill was Chairman of Blaby District Council for the last year (May 2016 to May 2017). The following is a summary of what was involved.



To some 'Chairman' might suggest being in charge of meetings, and indeed chairing meetings of full council is part of the role. However, the main part is representing the Council at events both within the district and further afield across the county, about a hundred events over the

year. Initially, it felt strange to go around wearing the chain of office, but it actually provided a conversation point at the more informal events. Frequent first question, 'Are you the mayor then?' – simple answer 'sort of', because the roles are effectively the same, and I think people have a better understanding of what a mayor does. Frequent second question, 'Is it (the chain) heavy?' – answer 'no', fortunately. The nice thing about the Blaby chain is that the links are engraved with the names of the parishes in the district, rather than the ephemeral Chairmen, and people were interested in finding their village.

The events included:

five Remembrance services, eleven carol services and seven charity curry nights;

visits to places I had never been before – Conkers, Belvoir Castle, the National Space Centre, the Diwali lights switch-on;

visits to local charities to see some of their work – Rainbows, Menphys, Vista's Kathleen Rutland home, Leicester Charity Link, and Company at Christmas.



My own charity for the year was the Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust, with the money going towards their work with children and young people, raising their awareness of wildlife.

I was privileged to attend lunch with (or in the same room as!) Her Majesty the Queen and Prince Philip when they visited on Maundy Thursday. I was also invited to a Royal Garden Party, which was the only occasion in the year when I wore a hat – except that as it was quite windy it probably spent more time in my hand than on my head!

There were sombre occasions too: the Cathedral service commemorating the 100th anniversary of the battle of the Somme; leading two periods of silence to remember Jo Cox MP and the victims of the Manchester bombing.

Yet perhaps the abiding memory will be of all the local people I met who volunteer in various ways within and for their communities, some of whom disconcertingly appeared again in a different context later in the year. It was not all older people either. Countesthorpe Beaver Scouts (a lovely if noisy bunch) received a national award for their links with the elderly in the village, a project that they had devised themselves. They were then going to use their prize money to improve the children's section of Countesthorpe Library. Older scouts from across the county, to whom I presented Queen's Scout and Duke of Edinburgh awards, were involved in activities ranging from riding for the disabled to church bell-ringing. Sometimes it is very easy, amid the disturbing and shocking news that we hear, to forget all the many good things that go on all the time.

Blaby's Civic Service was held at Blaby Methodist last September, with Rev David Vale leading the worship. David also gave the address at the carol service in the council chamber in December. A number of people said to me later 'Aren't you lucky in your minister!'. We think so too, and our only regret is that David has only been 'ours' for the last three of his years here. We shall miss him, but hope that he will have a long and happy retirement.


COSBY

T@4 at The Church Of The Nativity

When Ivan Bennett originally joined Nativity as our After School Club Leader little did we think at the time that he would go on to be appointed as our Anglican Lay Associate Minister (voluntary) and be responsible for the introduction of the 14th Nativity Scouts, Cubs and Beavers, plus the 3C's (Coffee, Craft and Chat) on Saturday mornings. Following the success of these Groups it was decided that the time was right to bring these communities together for Christian worship and discipleship in the form of an all age worship which would be attractive to them.

Following an open meeting held on 4th July 2016 it was decided to introduce a monthly T@4 Service on a Sunday afternoon which would be a mixture of fun, craft, Bible stories, music and food, i.e. a form of 'Messy Church'. This initiative has been fully supported by all of the religious leaders at Nativity, i.e. Revd John McGinley has offered Ivan the assistance of three interns to help with the organization of the worship and Fran even dropped in to help out prior to her departure on a holiday to Italy!

To help set up this service a Tier 1 Growth Fund grant was applied for from the Diocese and arising from this we were successfully awarded £1,600 towards the provision of the materials/equipment required for this type of worship.

T@4 commences in the schoolrooms with craft activities, which is a wonderful opportunity for friendships to be formed/extended, we then go into the church for an informal style of worship led by Ivan with the assistance of the two interns and Holland one of the young people who attends. The afternoon ends with a

community meal back in the schoolrooms.

The church has been providing the food as their contribution towards T@4 and although no charge is made service plates for donations are being made available both in the church and the schoolrooms.

The T@4 Service commenced in September 2016 and the people who have attended this service have summed it up in just one word 'amazing!'

Further changes are due to take place on the worship side at Nativity in the next few months as we shall be saying farewell to Fran as our Methodist Minister at the end of August 2017 and welcoming Revd Edson Dube in her place at the beginning of September. Ivan has also decided to extend his Christian journey and will be commencing training for ordination at the beginning of September and our support and prayers go with him as he begins this exciting new stage in his religious career.





SOUTH WIGSTON CHURCH UNION



In 1965, the Rev Ted Houghton was the min-

ister of the former Countesthorpe Road and Blaby Road Methodist Churches. At that time, discussions were taking place with the vicar, the Rev Neil Robinson, and the members of St Thomas' Church South Wigston, about the National Union of the Anglican and Methodist Churches. The Union did not go ahead, but the friendship of the two Methodist Churches flourished under the leadership of Ted Houghton, resulting in the two Churches coming together. Our Superintendent Minister at that time was the Rev Ron Corner, who played a very constructive part in the union.

It was decided to use the Blaby Road premises, but we really needed a new Church and a new name. The name was easy, we became the South Wigston Methodist Church, but how to become a new Church?

Alan Kind, an architect and a member of the congregation. came up with the revolutionary plan to put the Church upstairs and to use the downstairs for a lounge and ancillary rooms, whilst this proposal met with some opposition from the Home Missions Committee at District level, it was strongly supported by our Property Division at headquarters in Manchester.

Rev Ted Houghton left in July 1967 and the Rev John Barnsby joined us for one year, the first Service of the united congregation took place on **Sunday October 15th 1967**. It was some time before alterations to the building could began. Then, worship was held in the Schoolroom with the work going on around us. We were fortunate with our human resources, so there was no difficulty in filling posts, in fact for a time we worked with two members for many of them – think of the luxury of having two treasurers.

The Rev Arthur Rowe became our minister in September 1968, Arthur was the right man at the right time and was the catalyst in moulding the two congregations into one. Once the alterations were completed the "New Church" opened with a Service of Dedication on **Saturday April 24**th **1971.**

The approved cost for the building work was £14,500, with an overall cost, including furnishing and the organ was £17,000.

Stories don't have to be long, no more than 100 -120 words otherwise it will be necessary to edit them, but they each need an accompanying photo or photos. Websites are looked at, not just read. Colourful pictures always help.

There will also be a "Galleries" page If you've got a number of photos from your local church events and want these adding to your website but don't want to contribute a story to accompany them. We can create as many galleries as we want. The pictures will be grouped together so will need a title and an explanatory sentence or two.
