Her mother's wisdom to her three sons and seven daughters.

Her meditations and spiritual reflections.

To quote from the section headed Gratitude for God's goodness



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' I stand amazed at the boundless and inexhaustible goodness and mercy of God! That He should give to those that are so undeserving, so unmindful of him, and so regardless of and unthankful of his mercies.'

Obviously the language is that of the 18th Century but the message still engages with the reader in the 21st century.

I strongly recommend buying and reading this book . It will make an engaging and useful gift for anyone seeking to know more of Susanna, mother of John and Charles Wesley.

The Methodist Worship Book after 20 years


In 1990 the Methodist Conference directed the Faith and Order Committee to start work on a successor to *The Methodist Service Book (MSB)* which had been published in 1975. The impact of that earlier book on British Methodism had been immense. *MSB* had brought many of the insights of the Liturgical Movement into the worship of country chapels and suburban churches; it encouraged the use of the full service of word and sacrament; and promoted more frequent celebrations of the Lord's Supper. It had also brought about more widespread use of the Lectionary. The very success of *MSB* meant that Methodists had begun to ask for more material and greater variety of imagery in Sunday services and in Eucharistic worship as well as for greater sensitivity around the issue of inclusive language. The detailed work of producing new services was delegated to a liturgical subcommittee of about sixteen people, and during the 1990's draft orders of service were produced for experimental use in local churches. The Conference of 1998 gave final approval for the new book and it was published in February 1999 as *The Methodist Worship Book (MWB)*.

The *Preface* to *MWB* describes the book as "the latest in a succession of Methodist service books which can be traced back to John Wesley's *The Sunday Service* (1784). With more than 600 pages the book was more extensive than any of its predecessors and it was hoped that "its rich and comprehensive nature will help to enhance and renew the worship of the Methodist people". The orders of worship it contains were the fruit of a long process of drafting and revision and they take account both of liturgical and ecumenical developments throughout the world as well as distinctively Methodist traditions of worship.

One of the most notable features of *MWB* lies in its rich provision of services of Holy Communion: there are five separate orders celebrating the Christian seasons (each creating a different mood) and three orders are provided for 'Ordinary Time' – the weeks before Lent and after Pentecost. 'Prayer in the Morning' and 'Prayer in the Evening' anchor us in the Christian year and in the "seven whole days" of the Christian's week. The section entitled 'Morning, Afternoon, or Evening Services' provides a wealth of material for the 'Preaching Service'. There are orders of service for the three rites of passage – baptisms, marriages and funerals as well as confirmation, admission, commissioning, welcome and ordination services. A revised version of 'The Covenant Service' is included.

When *MWB* was published media interest focused on one phrase which appeared on page 204: "God our Father and our Mother, we give you thanks and praise..." The 1975 Service Book had been criticised by some for presenting an image of God in which concepts like omnipotence and lordship predominate. In *MWB* there was a conscious effort, perhaps especially in the wording of many of the Collects, to do justice to our understanding of God as loving, gracious and self-emptying. Throughout the book, and not just among the Collects, a wide range of imagery is employed in addressing or referring to God. In a recent article, written to mark the twentieth anniversary of its publication, Norman Wallwork has described *MWB* as "a landmark in liturgy" which continues to provide "a benchmark" for Methodist worship.

Why Jesus sent the Holy Spirit

INTRODUCTION

In His darkest hour Jesus prayed (Luke 22:41-44) while His close friends slept. I tend to be weak in emotionally charged moments like Jesus' friends. The images that I see of recent happenings in Cameroon make me feel helpless and angry at the same time. I remembered how calm and peaceful it was and rich in natural resources and how we took it for granted. There were instances of tribal conflicts but never at the scale where hospitals, schools or places of worship were targeted and burnt and bodies of people, young and old left on the streets. I found consolation in Romans 8:26-27.

["]In the same way, the **Spirit helps us in our weakness**. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the **Spirit Himself intercedes** for us through wordless groans. And He who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, **because the Spirit intercedes for God's people in accordance with the will of God**."

The words in bold became life reassuring that I was not alone; the Holy Spirit was with me. I felt a fresh sense of peace like the one spoken by Paul in Philip-

pians 4:7 (CEV) "... God will bless you with peace that no one can completely understand. And this peace will control the way you think and feel " The situation in my region remains a precarious one. But the Spirit of God within me gives me the strength to daily intercede for God's intervention.
