

Superintendent's letter



Dear Friends

The Summer edition of the Connexions magazine has just arrived, along with a letter from Barbara & Clive, the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference. In the letter, they write about how much they are looking forward to hearing our stories as they travel round the Connexion during their year in office, and they want us to "tell it like it is!".

We hear a great many stories - and I, too, love to hear about what is going on, how God is at work in the lives of God's people, and in the lives of our communities. I love to hear the stories of how people took risks, and how those risks have paid off. I also like to hear about what we have learned when the risk hasn't paid off, and what has happened as the result of (apparent) failure.

Each of our own individual stories is, of course, part of a much greater story - the story of God's love for the world, and the story of the ways in which God comes to us, and "abides" with us. God is with us, and that gives our individual stories their meaning.

Sometimes, the stories that I hear are stories of decline and weakness, of how things are not like they used to be. We can talk ourselves into believing that there is no hope, that there is no point trying anything, and that we are doomed to failure.

At other times, though, we try to edit the story to take out the difficult things, the things that we're not proud of. We pretend that everything's fine.

It is important to remember that we are part of the story of God. Our lives are held in God's grace and care, and God is at work in us and our lives, in our struggles, triumphs and failures. We need to try to tell the whole story, to show how God is at work in the world.

When I read the encouragement from Clive and Barbara to "tell it like it is!", I thought of Jesus' words, "you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free" (John 8:32).

The truth - the whole truth - of God's love for us, and God's constant, faithful presence gives our story a new meaning, one full of hope and grace for all.

Perhaps that simple phrase should be our motto. We are a people who will "tell it like it is". Telling honestly of the Good News of the gospel, as we see it in the lives of the people around us, so that everyone we meet might come to know the goodness of God in Christ. Paula

Summary of Clive Marsh's Conference Speech

At the beginning of his year in office as Vice-President of the Methodist Conference, Professor Clive Marsh, set out how life-experience can be contained in the relationship between pleasure, piety and politics. In addition, this framework can be used to commend the Christian faith to others.

Professor Marsh is Head of the University of Leicester's Vaughan Centre for Lifelong Learning and an International Research Consultant at the Queen's Foundation. He seeks to help people think creatively about how faith, life and popular culture interweave, and what happens to theology as a result.

In an address at the Representative Session of the Methodist Conference in Birmingham on Saturday 29 June, Professor Marsh said: "faith does not squeeze the pips out of life. On the contrary, faith allows us to enjoy life to the full. It gives us a measure of, and ways of discerning, what is genuinely life-enhancing."

Piety, Professor Marsh said: "at its best is about having a balanced, grounded, nourishing approach to daily life. Piety allows us to "make prayerful evaluations and hard choices about both the pleasure and politics which make up our life."

Contending that we "cannot let our lives be a simple amalgam of pleasure and piety", Professor Marsh said: "With all that's been happening in recent years — in this country and elsewhere — it's understandable, of course, why people have become disillusioned with political life. Brexit hasn't exactly encouraged British citizens to feel confident about the world of politics. Christians must not, though, become detached and distant from political processes."

What does it mean to be Inclusive?

Being welcoming?

Being friendly?

Perhaps having a ramp - but up to a side door, where it won't spoil the look of the church?

Being truly Inclusive is much more than this.

Being truly inclusive means knowing that we really are all members of one another, and we belong together. Knowing that the person whose mental health is fragile is a member of the Body of Christ. And so is the person whose child is fractious and disruptive (and so is the child). The person from a different culture, the one who has difficulty walking, and the one whose partner is the same gender - as well as the person whose gender we're not sure about - all these are beloved children of God, and part of the Body of Christ.

And so are the people who don't agree with us - and this is where it can get tricky!

Because the ones who think that we shouldn't waste money on repairing the loop system, who think that children should be silent in church, who think that women shouldn't preach, or teach, and who think that people who are new to the church should learn how to fit in with the way that we've always done it those people also belong in the Body.

Being truly inclusive is hard work. It requires patience, and tact, and making people welcome even if they don't agree with us (whilst not compromising or watering-down what we believe). It means being absolutely sure that God's love is for all, and every single one of us has a valuable contribution to make. It means treating everyone with respect.

Inclusive Church is a network of churches, groups and individuals who have committed themselves to making this real in their lives together. This is their vision:

"We believe in inclusive Church - church which does not discriminate, on any level, on grounds of economic power, gender, mental health, physical ability, race or sexuality. We believe in Church

- which welcomes and serves all people in the name of Jesus Christ;
- which is scripturally faithful;
- which seeks to proclaim the Gospel afresh for each generation;
- and which, in the power of the Holy Spirit, allows all people to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Jesus Christ."

Three of the churches in this Circuit belong to the Inclusive Church Network - look out for the logo on their Noticeboards and posters!

But shouldn't every church be like this?

If a church doesn't think like this, it probably isn't much of a church. By the same token, a church which is trying to be the Body Christ, to be a living witness to the love of God as expressed in the life of Jesus, will be inclusive.


If we, as church, are not *being* what we proclaim, then we won't have much of a mission either. For who will join us, if they do not feel that we respect them, value them, and listen to them?

A Day to Cherish

When the Methodist Art collection came to Leicester recently, I was intrigued to see the wide range of events connected to it and resolved to book a place on a day of "Reflective Drawing" – and I'm very pleased I did!

A small group of us met initially at the ancient Leicester St Nicholas Church with the option of moving on to the Cathedral. I felt that St Nicholas with its Anglo Saxon heritage and calm atmosphere was a lovely place in which to reflect on the art

work we had come to see. Led by artist Donna, we were invited to quietly move round, gazing gently on the pictures until one of them "spoke" to us, and evoked a response. Donna called this Visio Divina – gazing (reading the picture), receiving, responding.

My eyes fell upon Christ's Entry into Jerusalem by Norman Adams born 1927. In the reproductions I've seen of this (it's about 32 x 28 inches in water-colour) it has always seemed a bit of a jumble – flowers, especially sunflowers, animals, flags, dark figures standing out against vivid colours. But where is Jesus? It's always been difficult to find him. However, in the original there he is! In the centre, with the donkey in delicate shades of gold and green. And I thought – yes – that's how it is sometimes; we don't always find it easy to discover where Jesus is in the varied events of our daily lives. Sometimes we need help to see him and simply time to stop and gaze upon him.

Like the others in the group I was soon busy with paper, paints and colours and at the end of the day we shared any responses we had made to our chosen picture. It is always a special time when we can share, verbally or visually what we have experienced, and this seemed to me to be a worthwhile way of praying. It also opened my eyes again to the wealth of images, icons, sculptures, and other works of art which we find in our churches — if only we take time to stop and stare.

'The True Sabbath'

I read somewhere recently that we should all try to reinstate the true Sabbath-not a bad idea I thought.

So wrote the Editors in the last edition of the Beacon.

I, alas, almost got 'caught out' by not knowing the detail of the Jewish Sabbath! My account may not be what the editors had in mind, but I hope you enjoy my tale when I learnt a bit more about the Jewish Sabbath.

In 2015 Sue & I were on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. For the first part we were based at a hotel near the Damascus Gate in Jerusalem. Over the 10 day very moving pilgrimage there was almost no free time in the busy schedule, except for a few hours from about 3pm on Friday afternoon.

In our travels around Jerusalem I had spotted the new tramway that had been built through the city. Sue went back to visit the 'Garden Tomb' which we had visited the day before and I went off for a ride on the tram.

There was only one 'line' so I thought I could not get lost. At the Damascus Gate 'station' I purchased the ticket for about 2 hours travel and boarded the tram intending to ride to the terminus and back to see some of the engineering involved in construction of this modern tramway.

I travelled north; I got chatting with another passenger who was quite amazed that I had joined the tram simply for the ride, but threw his hands in horror when I said I would be returning almost as soon as I arrived at the terminus. He said I should probably be stranded there because the trams stopped running on the Sabbath. I would need a taxi to get back!

When I said I understood the Jewish Sabbath was a Saturday, he explained it started on a Friday before sunset. I thanked him for his explanation and hurriedly alighted having only travelled part-way along the tram route and caught the next tram going south to avoid being stranded at Pisgat Ze'ev which was the terminus, and a long way from our hotel! My lesson learnt that (thanks to the passenger I chatted to) the Jewish Sabbath isn't just on a Saturday!

She mentioned the incident when Jesus healed a man with physical disabilities on the Sabbath—unheard of in the rules and regulations of Jewish Law. Jesus brought His own law of love.

We are forgiven people! However, we continue to make our own rules like Sunday shopping etc.

When I was a child, I was not even allowed to play outside with my friends on the Sabbath, another human rule which I vetoed for my own child. Today's children have so much more going for them on the Sabbath including football, boxing, etc. These activities are vital for their mental and physical growth.

So, what is the "true" Sabbath for Christians now in 2019? I would venture to say that maybe it lies somewhere between the two extremes as it did for the Israelites of old and the young Christian church at Galatia. We need to pray, PRAY, and pray more to explore the will of God for today on this issue.

Monday group. Travels of a £10 Pom

It was my first time at the Monday Group.

As a visitor I only had to pay £2, and that included a hot drink and a biscuit . I was made welcome as a newcomer, and I soon realised that there were people there that I knew.

Shirley started the evening by reading a monologue about a child's trip to the seaside, in the style of Pam Ayres. It was very entertaining and later she told me that she had written it herself. She also told me some details about her earlier life, which would make another interesting talk.

Val told us that she had trained as a nurse in U.K. then went to Australia as a £10 Pom, and trained in Sydney as a midwife. She was the only non -Australian on the course. She said people under 40 would not know the term £10 Pom, and I confirmed this by asking my nephew, and a young friend.

Val took a job working at a mission in the outback of Queensland, caring for Aboriginal Australians. She knew nothing about their culture, was not aware that the hospital was an unfinished shell, and that the team she was joining was actually just her.

She told us that she left for Sydney after a few weeks, when a child nearly died because of her ignorance of tropical diseases but was saved when the flying doctor was sent for. Since then she has read up on the history of the missions, and how the Aboriginals have been treated over the years.

I intend to go again, as they have a varied selection of speakers, and hope that Val is soon invited back, so I find out what happened next.
